O! Christmas Tree

Real (natural) trees are regaining popularity, and with good reason. Tens of millions of them are farmed domestically in all 50 states—unlike artificial trees, 85% of which are imported from China. If you do opt for an artificial tree, consider purchasing one second-hand, and donate trees you no longer want.

Keep it simple. Skip needless extras on the tree, like tinsel, which just create extra waste. Avoid splurging on new ornaments—check local thrift stores, or craft your own. An heirloom guilt makes a unique tree skirt.

Consider decorating a tree in the yard with popcorn chains, cranberries, and pine cones rolled in peanut butter & bird seed. It's unique, and the critters outside will enjoy the holiday treat.
