Keeping It Clean and Green



The 2016 Great American Cleanup begins taking registrations on Feb. 22. School groups, 4-H clubs, Boy Scout troops, and other volunteers are needed to help with this effort to improve our community. The Great American Cleanup is the nation's largest annual litter pickup, beautification, and community improvement program.

During the 2015 Great American Cleanup, volunteers picked up enough litter from public places in Clark County to fill 826 trash bags. We hope this year's Cleanup will remove even more litter from our roadways, parks, and other spots and make Clark County truly clean and green.

In 2015, the Great American Cleanup enlisted 1,790 volunteers in Clark County. Those people – both children and adults – gave more than 2,500 hours of their time.

School groups play a major role in the Great American Cleanup. Participating in the Cleanup can be an extension of classroom lessons about community service, nature, and the environment.

Keep Clark County Beautiful, the local affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, sponsors the Great American Cleanup in Clark County.

How to Get Involved

- Organize a group of volunteers, then pick a public place and a date (from March 1 through May 31) to clean it up.
- KCCB will provide each group with trash bags and gloves, a token prize for each volunteer, and help with pickup of collected litter, if needed.

Decorate grocery bags for Earth Day

Meijer stores will distribute the paper sacks to shoppers the week of April 17-23

A paper grocery bag can become a medium for a young person's environmental message in the Earth Day Groceries Project. The Clark County Solid Waste District works with Meijer to provide the bags.

To participate in this free activity, a school or other organization should designate a coordinator and fill out the form below. Requests should be made **no later than Feb. 23**. Call Linda Mitchell at 521-2023, or email to lmitchell@clarkcountyohio.gov.

The paper grocery bags will be delivered to your school the week of March 7-11. Once the bags are decorated, someone from your school should take them to the Meijer store during the week of April 11-15. The store will distribute the bags to shoppers during the week of Earth Day, April 17-23.

The Solid Waste District distributed 4,560 bags to 21 Clark County schools in 2014. Thousands more participated in this project nationwide.

Students can be as creative as they want in sharing their thoughts on how to respect the Earth. We do ask that teachers review what students create to be sure the message is a positive one. For ideas, check out www.earthdaybags.org.

KCCB board seeking youth representative

Keep Clark County Beautiful (KCCB) is seeking a youth representative to serve on its board. Any Clark County high school student with a GPA of at least 3.0 (on a 4-point scale) is eligible to apply.

The youth representative will be a full voting member and will be expected to attend board meetings six times a year, serve on a subcommittee, and volunteer for KCCB events as available. The term would be from July 1, 2016, to June 30, 2017. Two youth representatives currently serve on the board.

KCCB is the local affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, the nation's

largest volunteer-based community action and education organization, that focuses on litter prevention, waste reduction, and community beautification.

District can support waste reduction efforts

The Clark County Solid Waste District can provide support up to \$500 for waste reduction programs in schools.

Waste reduction programs can include starting a recycling program, enhancing a current recycling program, or a field trip or other educational program that deals with solid waste issues.

A school can apply for assistance by downloading an application form from the District's web site, www.32trash.org. Go to the "Schools" page and click on the link for the application form.
