Time to Clean Up!



The 2017 Great American Cleanup begins taking registrations on Feb. 20. School groups, 4-H clubs, Boy Scout troops, and other volunteers are needed to help with this effort to improve our community. The Great American Cleanup is the nation's largest annual litter pickup, beautification, and community improvement program.

During the 2016 Great American Cleanup, volunteers picked up enough litter from public places in Clark County to fill 522 trash bags. We hope this year's Cleanup will remove even more litter from our roadways, parks, and other spots and make Clark County truly clean and green.

In 2016, the Great American Cleanup enlisted 1,200 volunteers in Clark County. Those people – both children and adults – gave 2,350 hours of their time.

School groups play a major role in the Great American Cleanup. Participating in the Cleanup can be an extension of classroom lessons about community service, nature, and the environment.

Keep Clark County Beautiful, the local affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, sponsors the Great American Cleanup in Clark County.

The Clark County Solid Waste District is dedicated to providing resources and learning opportunities to promote waste reduction practices.

Decorate grocery bags for Earth Day

Meijer stores will distribute the paper sacks to shoppers the week of April 16-22

A paper grocery bag can become a medium for a young person's environmental message in the Earth Day Groceries Project. The Clark County Solid Waste District works with Meijer to provide the bags.

To participate in this free activity, a school or other organization should designate a coordinator and fill out the form below. Requests should be made **no later than Feb. 24.** Call Linda Mitchell at 521-2023, or email to Imitchell@clarkcountyohio.gov.

The paper grocery bags will be delivered to your school the week of March 13-17. Once the bags are decorated, someone from your school should take them to the Meijer store during the week of April 10-14. The store will distribute the bags to shoppers during the week of Earth Day, April 16-22.

The Solid Waste District distributed 1,710 bags to 10 Clark County schools in 2016. Thousands more participated in this project nationwide.

Free workshop teaches on water issues

The Clark County Solid Waste District and the Clark County Park District are sponsoring a free workshop on teaching about water issues. The workshop had been planned for October, but has been rescheduled for March 8 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the Davidson Interpretive Center, 5638 Lower Valley Pike, next to George Rogers Clark Park.

The workshop will introduce 25 teachers to the "Healthy Water Healthy People" and "WOW! The Wonders of Wetlands" curriculum and activity guides.

"Healthy Water Healthy People" was developed by Project WET (Water Education for Teachers). It focuses on water quality issues for grades 6 through 12. Most activities can be adapted for earlier ages.

"WOW! The Wonders of Wetlands" includes over 50 hands-on activities in lesson plan format and extensive background information on wetlands.

A grant from the Ohio Environmental Education Fund will pay for substitute fees for teachers who participate. The workshop will offer six contact hours.

Workshop participants will be expected to share their learnings with their colleagues within one month and use at least one activity with their students within the school year.

Wittenberg University will offer one hour of graduate credit for any workshop participant who completes an additional six hours of work. The registration fee will be \$185.
